



## Aliansi Masyarakat Adat Nusantara (AMAN) is leading this pilot initiative.

By law, all forest land in Indonesia is owned either by the state or private stakeholders thereby ignoring the thousands of indigenous communities that manage their land according to customary laws. However, in 2013 a Constitutional Court decision recognized indigenous customary rights to forests; and in 2014 the government committed to forest tenure reform. The new administration has consulted with the national indigenous organization, AMAN,



and several other land rights organizations to formulate a plan to advance indigenous rights. The Tenure Facility is supporting AMAN to mobilize support for this new political momentum to implement the government's commitments. This initiative is increasing readiness at the district level for the legal recognition of indigenous land rights, and strengthening legal and administrative instruments at the national executive and legislative levels for the recognition and protection of these rights.
